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Keynote Speaker: Mary Kelly Foy MP)



The UK is experiencing multiple, interconnecting crises. The Covid-19 pandemic – and its associated policy responses – continues to produce disproportionate outcomes for minority communities in myriad ways that will be outlined in the forthcoming independent <u>public inquiry</u>.

In addition to the health inequalities both created and entrenched by the pandemic, people from a wide variety of backgrounds are experiencing the most significant cost-of-living crisis in decades. Inflation is rising, and <u>Jack Monroe's work with the Office of National Statistics</u> has shown that the inflation rate for some essential food staples is as high as 50%. Energy prices in the UK are spiralling, with the energy watchdog warning bills could go as high as £3,300 this winter.

The impact of this cost-of-living crisis is having a devastating impact on people in the UK, who have endured a lost decade of wage stagnation and reduced access to benefits and other public services due to the political choice of austerity. But the inescapable reality is some groups will be more affected than others. Moving into this crisis, some people from Gypsy, Roma, and Traveller backgrounds have lower rates of educational attainment and higher levels of unemployment than the non-GRT population.

Economic struggles are simultaneously affecting, and are affected by, an unfolding mental health emergency. Waiting times for Children and Mental Health Services(CAMHS) now routinely exceed a year, and thousands of <u>children and young people have attempted suicide</u> whilst still waiting for treatment. The continued failure of the NHS and the Coroner's office to fully include ethnicities in their data frameworks means there is no reliable data for people from Gypsy, Roma, and Traveller backgrounds. However, community reports of deaths by suicide – particularly amongst children and young people– are increasing at an alarming rate.

To address these profound challenges, the 2022 Traveller Movement conference will bring together Gypsy, Roma and Traveller community members, campaigners, policymakers, and other stakeholders to consider the relationship between poverty, inequality, and mental health within GRT communities specifically.

In many communities there is a stigma attached to discussions around material deprivation and mental health. This year our conference will push back against this stigma and instead promote the narrative that poverty and mental illness are not individual failings for which people should be shamed; but the result of structural and institutional failings which lead to the discrimination and disempowerment of entire communities and ethnic groups.

1. MAKING ENDS MEET

The cost-of-living crisis is profoundly affecting the lives of millions of people all over the country. Although Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people are known for their resilience and are experts in surviving with very little, the impact of spiralling inflation and energy prices is also affecting these communities. This session will explore how people from Gypsy, Roma and Traveller backgrounds are navigating the unfolding crises, with a particular focus on how deep community links are used to further develop systems of mutual support, solidarity, and resilience in the face of Government inaction.

The workshop will bring policymakers, changemakers, Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people together to explore how to secure lasting and positive change from the grassroots up and from the government down.



2. WE NEED TO TALK ABOUT SUICIDE

The suicide of a loved one is an incredibly traumatic experience. This workshop will give Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people a safe space to talk about what support they need from the NHS, the third sector and within the community when they are affected by suicide. Research confirms that Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities face significant health inequalities which exacerbates the risks known to increase an individual's vulnerability to suicide as well as weaken protective factors. In order to help reduce suicide rates, it is imperative that we consult and work alongside communities and individuals.

This workshop will discuss how we need to shape future interventions and what solutions are necessary to have a real impact on reducing suicide rates within Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities.

3. NO RIGHT WAY TO BE A TRAVELLER

No two Gypsies, Roma or Travellers are the same, but there can be a lot of pressure to live life a certain way – to marry young, only to work within family business, or to stay in an unhappy relationship. Those Gypsy, Roma and Traveller individuals who decide to live their lives outside the accepted norms, are often shamed for it. Shame and pressure can push Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people to hide that they are LGBT, experiencing domestic abuse, attending college, experiencing mental health difficulties or struggling to make ends meet. Hiding your identity and experience can negatively impact your mental health. Quick flash, crime, arranged marriage and suicide can be a result of shaming and scandalising.

This workshop will celebrate the strength and courage of the individuals who, despite taking a different path, are still very much part of their ethnic communities. We will explore, in a safe space, pathways to healthy and happy lives and communities.

4. SEE US, HEAR US, DON'T FORGET US!

The Traveller Movement's Roads to Success research in 2021 identified how Youth Services across the United Kingdom are not delivered uniformly or consistently. Organisations in the public, private, and voluntary sectors, who are involved in the commissioning or delivery of youth work services, are missing opportunities for partnership and collaborative working, leading to a disjointed provision of services for Gypsy, Roma and Traveller young people. There is a mental health crisis within these communities and among young people, and there appears to be limited awareness, engagement and understanding about this in the youth sector.

Drawing on the expertise and experience of those service users and those delivering youth services, this workshop will explore how the public, private, and voluntary youth sectors can promote more joined-up ways of working that helps to support the mental health of young Gypsies, Roma and Travellers, while promoting pathways into better training and employment opportunities.
